



# Alconbury Weald's Community Park opening in June

The Community Park sits just north of the Primary School and pulls together a range of new amenities including:

- An adventure playground with a 7m tower and slide, climbing frames, balance beams, ropes and swings;
- A SkatePark, which will appeal to beginners as well as the more experienced;
- A multi-use games area for a variety of sports such as tennis, mini-tennis, netball and basketball. Designed for all ages and abilities including wheelchair users:
- Seating areas for people to relax and meet friends;
- The first of Alconbury Weald's allotments:
- The development's first community shop – Swynford Stores.

The next phase of the Community Park - following later in the summer - will also see a café open and a cycle and pedestrian trail, which will provide connection to the wider footpaths and cycleways across Grange Farm.



Both the existing play area opposite the school and the new larger play area at the Community Park have gained considerable interest and comment for their design and use of timber.

The team worked with play space designer, Stuart Deans, on the layout. Stuart said: "Creating an outdoor space for families to meet, socialise, relax and play is of the upmost importance; especially when building a new community. The play design ethos is intergral to successful group and social play in this new outdoor space. The Park invites all ages and abilities to enjoy an open and friendly community environment."

One of the most important features of this project is the aspirational play element included within the overall design. The layout encourages children to start in a place where they feel comfortable based on their abilities and aspirations, beginning with negotiating smaller play products, and naturally progressing with confidence

onto the climbing tree tower through the trees. The larger feature tower is the ultimate rush with the 13m long tunnel slide, which requires upper body strength and a head for heights!

Over the next couple of weeks

a range of new facilities will be

opening up for new residents

and local communities.

The play space incorporates free play areas and play equipment which stimulates dynamic, social, adventure and guiet play. The landscaping and wider setting look to expand this out into natural play around the wider area, and create spaces people will visit time and again.

The equipment is made from a special sustainable timber called Robinia, which is harvested, prepared and constructed in a way that ensures a natural look and feel while providing safety, strength and durability.

The SkatePark has been designed by Canvas Spaces, and throughout the summer skate classes will be running each weekend, see page 16 for more details.

# The first community shop at Alconbury Weald has been fitted out and opens on Friday 7 July.

Located next to the Community Park, just past Ermine Street Church Academy, Swynford Stores will sell everyday essentials such as milk, bread and tinned goods.

Adrian and Samantha Wardman, who have run Abbots Ripton Village Store and Post Office for over three years, will be running the shop as part of an expansion that will enable them to take on staff and introduce a wider range of products to both stores.

Adrian said: "Local stores are an essential part of village life; they sit at the heart of the community and are a place where friends can meet, collect their newspapers and pick up everyday essentials.

"We came across the Abbots Ripton store by accident but it felt like home from the moment we moved in. There is a real community spirit - everyone looks out for each other and it is fantastic to be part of such a friendly village.

Swynford Stores will initially open Monday to Friday from 7.30am to 1pm and on Saturdays from 8am to 12.30pm - with the range of goods and the opening hours increasing as more residents move in.



"We are very excited about the community shop at Alconbury Weald and we want to make sure it has the same spirit, at the centre of the growing community. We've been working closely with the Urban&Civic team who have been a tremendous help and support setting everything up."



The priority for the Project Team is to co-ordinate the delivery of the plans across infrastructure, landscape, commercial buildings and new homes. Planning ahead so that the infrastructure is in ahead of time, landscape features are delivered as part of the natural cycle of seasons, and facilities are ready to be rolled out when needed is a full time job for Urban&Civic's Natalie Turland:

- "Our next priority is completing work around the Listed Watch Office and its setting of the Memorial Garden and Green, as well as the Cricket Pitch and Green on the other side of the road. This is a critical part of the development, as it is the place where the Enterprise Campus meets the new homes, and literally where the old meets the new with the Listed World War II Watch Office as a central feature to the first phase of the development.
- "The amount of careful masterplanning and design work that has gone into this next section of the development goes hand in hand with the care and thoughtful development that needs to happen around both a Listed Building and the area of a tragic incident of 1943, which will be marked on the Memorial Green.
- "The design breaks down into a series of smaller project areas, which each has its own project plan with all the contractors briefed and working as part of a single team.

- "Alconbury Weald is a fantastic project to be involved with and it's really rewarding to see plans become a reality. There's always a lot happening and we work with a great team of designers and contractors that share our commitment to quality and rise to the challenges we set them.
- "The team live and breathe the project, and have embraced Urban&Civic's vision. Everyone working on the project has made a long term commitment, so we all want to see a great job done – from planting trees and installing play equipment, to putting in infrastructure and constructing iconic buildings."

# **Coming next**

Work on the community spaces around the listed **Watch Office** is well underway and it won't be long before the area is transformed and available for the local community – both business and residential – to enjoy. The area will provide a focal point for the development, sitting in pride of place between the homes and business community in the first phase of Alconbury Weald's development.


# Watch Office refurbishment

Plans have been developed for the sympathetic refurbishment of the Listed Building, which was the first permanent structure when the site became an airfield; dating from 1940 and constantly updated during the war. The building includes a connected Nissen Hut, used as a briefing room for pilots setting off on missions and has various internal rooms, office space and a viewing platform on the first floor.

The plans have been developed with conservation officers to maintain as much of the original structure, doors, windows and other features as possible, while updating it to be structurally sound, comply with modern safety standards, and ensure it has a sustainable future to secure its long term use.

The plans will see the Nissen Hut come forward for community use, with some heritage features and displays, while the main office areas will become the Cambridgeshire headquarters for the environmental and social charity, Groundwork, with whom Urban&Civic has a long term collaboration.

In future phases, a lift will be put in to enable use of the first floor room, which will provide unique space for meetings and events as well as an important heritage space to tell the Second World War story of the site.





# **Cricket Park**

The Cricket Park is well underway, marked by a ring of lime trees, which will edge the boundary, and banked areas will provide informal green seating areas for spectators. Specialist contractors have been putting in an extensive drainage systems that sits underneath the pitch. The pitch areas and outfield are in development, and will take three years to mature before the pitch can be used for cricket. Just one example of the forward planning needed when working on a development like this.

# Watch Office Green

The area in front of the Watch Office will become an important area of green space for people to enjoy, but also to contemplate the echoes of history as part of the Memorial Garden. Dipped slightly to ensure a reverence and clear view of the Listed Building, the green space will include a memorial to the 19 young men killed in a tragic accident in May 1943.

The incident occurred while bombs were being loaded into B-17s from the 95th Bomb Group. A temporary memorial was put up by Urban&Civic in 2013 to mark the 70th anniversary of the incident, but this will become the permanent memorial – developed with input from the USAF veteran groups and local aviation heritage groups - and will mark the spot of the airfield's worst loss of life throughout the conflict.







# **Green Team** flourishes with 100% success

Following the successful pilot of its Green Team initiative in Cambridgeshire last summer, EDGE partner Groundwork East recruited a new team of volunteers to work on the allotments at the first Community Park at Alconbury Weald.

The project has been run by community of a team and gain valuable skills and charity Groundwork and Green Team members were given the opportunity to place to get a job going forward. learn new skills, gain qualifications and improve their employment prospects while helping to create green spaces for the local community to enjoy.

The project work was supported by Whiting Landscapes to give the team experience in practical horticulture, landscaping, timber construction, concreting, fencing, planting and hedging. This was then supplemented by skills and employability training from Groundwork.

On completion of the 14 week course participants gained a Level 1 Diploma in Practical Horticulture and functional skills in English and Maths, but critically also undertook CV updating, interview skills and mock interview practice with real life businesses.

Andrea Finbow, EDGE Advisor and Employment and Community Project Supervisor for Groundwork East, said: "Groundwork has a strong track record of using landscape projects to give people the experience, confidence and qualifications to find their first job or get back into work.

"The Teams gain a real sense of achievement from seeing their work transform an area. It also helps them maintain a regular routine, work as part

qualifications, which put them in a good

"We involve local companies at every stage – from practical experience to help with mock interviews and employability tips - so that, throughout the course, team members have the chance to build links with local businesses. This is especially true on the Alconbury Weald project where the team worked alongside Urban&Civic's contractors and had mock and real interviews for jobs coming up on site."

The allotment project was funded by Urban&Civic as part of Alconbury Weald's commitment to use the development of the former airfield site to provide training and employment opportunities for local people.

The team also worked hand in hand with the A14 Project contractors, who are recruiting to a range of vacancies for the £1.8billion investment project.

The project ended with an awards ceremony on 28 April, at which Groundwork was able to confirm that one of the participants had been offered a job at Huntingdonshire District Council's grounds maintenance team, while the other three had been offered jobs by A14 contractors, giving the scheme a 100% success rate.

### Meet the Alconbury Weald Green Team volunteers:

Sam Coelho (28) said: "I was a professional chef for 10 years but the long hours and minimum wages meant it's not a good long term career. I want to work outdoors and am interested in botany and horticulture, but needed to build up my qualifications. Green Team has given me a great start."

Jayson Hunter (20) said: "After being made redundant from a major supermarket, I found out about Green Team at the Jobcentre and am really enjoying the change of direction."

Shane Fulcher (45) has had a variety of jobs and the Green Team has provided a step to getting back on his feet after becoming homeless. "The course has been a positive step for the future and a great experience. I have learnt a lot of practical skills as well as how to deal with people, manage stress and understand my weaknesses and how to overcome them. I'm in a shared house now as well and am feeling more positive about the future.'

Lee Pearce (55) suffered a head injury that left him having to relearn basic skills after coming out of a coma, he said: "I am physically fit but have had some challenges following my head injury and want to channel hardships into something positive. I want to get back to work and see the Green Team as a stepping stone to future employment."

# **Contractor focus** Whiting Landscapes

Whiting Landscape has been working hand in hand with the development's landscape design team from day one, using innovative and practical techniques to deliver the quality of landscape setting that is a core part of the Alconbury Weald vision.



has around 120 staff and will soon be celebrating its 40th anniversary. The company has a team of 25 working at Alconbury Weald, and has recently been supporting the Green Team project on the community allotments.

Ian Collins at Whiting Landscape said: "We are deeply committed to enhancing the landscape and ecological impact of our projects and their influence on the environment and it is great to work with Urban&Civic as they embrace this approach on all their strategic development projects.

"Landscaping has been prioritised from the very beginning at Alconbury Weald and we have already planted hundreds of trees, sown thousands of wildflower seeds and established drainage ponds - all of which will be used to increase biodiversity and create new habitats."

Established in 1977, Whiting Landscape Whiting Landscape also has extensive experience working with trees and plants, and has in-house facilities to containergrow semi mature trees. This provides flexibility to install landscape works outside the normal planting season.

> Whiting Landscape work closely with other disciplines delivering Alconbury Weald. Close collaboration with the Breheny team working on groundwork and infrastructure, as well as other contractors, is vital.

Early landscaping activity included:

- Advanced and on-going woodland trees and shrub planting to create an attractive frontage along Ermine Street as the military fences started to come down.
- Trans-locating trees on site using the largest tree spade in Europe to save the trees and add instant maturity to the setting for new homes.

- Landscaping the Ermine Street entrance and planting trees including three large limes, each weighing over eight tonnes, which required a 200 tonne crane to put them in place.
- Creating a green corridor along the eastern boundary with Little Stukeley, providing an important ecological habitat.
- Establishing the setting for the school plaza and creating a woodland park.

Work in progress alongside the Cricket Pitch and Community Park includes:

- Avenue of lime trees with cherry trees at major crossing points along the main internal link roads.
- 28 mature London Planes planted around the cricket pitch.
- Enterprise Zone planting and drainage ponds to create landscaping and wildlife habitats across the first phase of buildings.

# **Ermine Street Church Academy** School update

Ermine Street Church Academy is Alconbury Weald's first primary school and, as well as welcoming new pupils, it plays a fundamental role within the new community and provides facilities for the community to use out of school hours.

We spoke to head teacher Adrian Shepherd to see how things are shaping up at the school and to find out more about how the school is being used by the local community.

### Hi Adrian, how is it going at the school?

Everything is going really well. We now have 36 children, over three times more than when we opened in September, and we have over 60 pupils enrolled for the start of the next school year. Our before and after school provision - The Hangar Club - is now open from 7.45-8.40am and 3.20-6.00pm.

### What have been some of your highlights this year?

There's so much to choose from! We held a Big Breakfast in February and were joined by around 60 people who came to school early to enjoy bacon sandwiches, toast and cereal to help raise money for Young Carers. Our Pancake Races event for the school and the local community on 28 February was a lot of fun and it was great to see the adults enjoying it as much as the children.

We had our first class assemblies in March, with some great performances, singing and lots of learning shared. Our reception children also enjoyed their first school trip - to Sacrewell Farm - and all the children are very excited about the trip we have planned to take the whole school to the seaside in July.

### And what else do you have planned in the run up to the end of term?

We have lots to look forward for the rest of the summer term... the children being able to play on the school field and use the new skate park in the community park, our first sports event and a picnic for the children and parents, which will involve the burial of a time capsule.

We are also looking forward to our official opening on 20 September 2017 – information about the ceremony and celebratory events will be posted on the website as they are confirmed: erminestreetca.org.uk

### How is the school becoming an integral part of the local community?

We want parents and the local community to feel a part of Ermine Street Church Academy. Parents come into the school regularly - for parents evening, sharing learning sessions, class assemblies and information sessions. Then we extend into the local community with events like the Pancake Races and our community coffee mornings where local residents and parents of children at the school can meet and catch up over a cuppa.

We also have facilities that the community can use out of school hours and hope to host some health provision, a mobile library for local residents and act as a postal collection point.

### Can you tell us a bit more about the community facilities available at the school?

We have a space called 'The Studio' (a similar size to a classroom), the main hall (which can be divided into two smaller spaces), a community kitchenette, a fully equipped cookery room and community office space.

We currently have regular bookings for Brownies and table tennis and have adult evening classes in craft and cookery. Rock Choir has used the hall once and we have had enquiries about dance and fitness clubs.

# **Jemima House** Nursery update

Alconbury Weald's day nursery opened at the beginning of November last year to provide care for children from six weeks to five years of age, between 7.30am and 6pm, Monday to Friday, all-year round.

We caught up with Beverley Taylor-Carson (Operations and HR Manager) and Jo Whitmore (Nursery Manager) to find out how things are shaping up at Jemima House and to find out what they are looking forward to in the coming months.

### Hello. How are you settling into Alconbury Weald?

We've settled in very quickly indeed, and it already feels like we've been open for ages! We were lucky to start with lots of beautiful new resources and it's been lovely to see the children using these and the specially-equipped age spaces we have available for them; the walls are already lined with the children's creative efforts and this has made the nursery feel very homely. 
### What have been some of your highlights since opening?



# Heritage It's all in the name

### The history of the site is vitally

important and we are keen to reflect this in the street names at Alconbury Weald. While streets in the residential area will include the names of those who historically owned or farmed the land, the Enterprise Campus will incorporate some of the engineers, design teams, aircrew and aircraft that from service to become chief designer were based here at the former airfield.

### PIERSON ROAD

Reginald Kirshaw 'Rex' Pierson CBE was an English aircraft designer. He joined Vickers as an apprentice in 1908 and by 1917 was their chief aircraft designer. He designed the Vickers Vimy heavy bomber during World War I, the first aircraft to cross the Atlantic non-stop.

He was also chief designer of the Vickers Wellington twin-engined bomber, which formed the backbone of RAF Bomber Command in World War II. They were based at RAF Alconbury from November 1941 and saw action over a number of German cities - remaining on site until the handover to the USAF in 1942.

Pierson was promoted to chief engineer in 1946 and his postwar designs included the Viking, Valetta and Viscount.

### BARNWELL ROAD

Captain Frank Sowter Barnwell OBE was a British aeronautical engineer. He built the first successful powered aircraft in Scotland with his brother in 1910 and when war broke out in 1914 he enlisted as a pilot in the Royal Flying : experimental Boeing XB-15 bomber Corps. In August 1915 he was released at Bristol Aeroplane Company where he put his experience of service conditions to use designing the Bristol Fighter.

As head of design, he developed the Bristol Blenheim, which flew out of Alconbury from April-November 1940 with 15 Squadron and 40 Squadron.

### LOBELLE WAY

Marcel Lobelle was a Belgian aeronautical engineer who spent his professional career in Britain. He fought in the Belgian Army at the start of World War I, with the 1st Regiment of Grenadiers. He was seriously wounded during the Battle of the Yser in October 1914. On being discharged from the army in 1917 he moved to Britain and eventually became chief designer at Fairey Aviation, where he designed the Fairey Swordfish and Fairey Battle bomber, which was based at Alconbury in 1940-41.

### EMERY CRESCENT

The prototype B-17, with the Boeing factory designation of Model 299, was designed by a team of engineers led by *E. Gifford Emery* and Edward Curtis Wells. It combined features of the with the Boeing 247 transport aircraft.

The B-17's armament consisted of up to 4.800lb of bombs on two racks in the bomb bay behind the cockpit, and initially possessed five .30 caliber machine auns.

B-17s flew from across the region, as part of the Eighth Air Force, and in 1943 the legendary 482nd Group was formed, known as 'Pathfinder', which used radar-led 'blind bombing' techniques in specially adapted B-17s, many of which flew from Alconbury.

The Crescent runs around the location of the B-17 explosions of 1943 that killed 19 aircrew. They will be commemorated with a Memorial in front of the Listed Watch Office, where the explosion took place.

# New office space

Planning permission has been granted for new office space, which will be located on the main tree-lined Boulevard alongside The Incubator and The Club.

The new offices will have a flexible floorplan to ensure the immediate and future needs of tenants can be realised and is being developed in response to strong business demand to be part of the growing business community at the Governmentbacked Enterprise Zone.

The office was designed by Allford Hall Monaghan Morris (AHMM) – architects of the award-winning Incubator and The Club – and will complement these buildings in design approach, form and character.

The building will have a strong sustainability focus and the efficient use of resources such as water and energy will be ensured through a variety of methods including natural ventilation, a solar shading canopy and photovoltaic panels. In addition, links to pedestrian and cycle routes, a covered cycle store, public transport and a Green Travel Plan will encourage new tenants to use sustainable modes of transport.

A number of businesses have already expressed interest in taking space in the new office, which should be available from late Spring 2018.





# Ground breaking marks start of **IKO** construction

IKO, global leader in roofing, waterproofing and insulation products, held a 'Spade in the Ground' event in March to mark the start of construction of its 470,000 sq ft insulation factory at Alconbury Enterprise Campus.

Local stakeholders including Jonathan Djanogly, MP for Huntingdon and representatives from Huntingdonshire District Council, Stukeleys Parish Council and Urban&Civic joined IKO at the event.

Andy Williamson, IKO UK Group Managing Director said: "I'm delighted to mark the start of construction of IKO's new insulation factory with an event that involves key members of the local community. IKO is already employing people from the surrounding area and the plant, once operational, will create an additional 160 jobs. The development of this factory is a great example of UK manufacturing."

The new factory represents a £30 million investment by IKO and, when fully operational, the factory will produce insulation for around 40,000 homes a year in the UK. This will have a major impact on helping the Government achieve the Climate Change Act's current target to reduce carbon emissions by 80% by 2050. By manufacturing insulation boards in the UK, the factory will also help reduce the environmental impact and cost of importing materials from abroad.

The factory is due to be completed by the end of 2017, with an official opening planned for March 2018.

bio-bean has industrialised the process of recycling waste coffee grounds into advanced biofuels and can process 50,000 tonnes a year, one in 10 cups of coffee drunk in the UK. As well as making effective use of a waste product, the process reduces the amount of coffee waste being sent to landfill and the associated financial and environmental costs.

Waste coffee grounds are collected from coffee suppliers - including chains such as Costa and Leon - and are transported to the facility where they are processed to create a high-performance, sustainable alternative to conventional solid fuels, fossil fuels and imported woody biomass.

# **Local Enterprise Partnership** £37.6m cash boost to help create local jobs and growth

In February, Communities Secretary Sajid Javid announced a government cash boost of £37.6 million for the Greater Cambridge Greater Peterborough area.

New investment in business scale-up and innovation on the area's Enterprise Zones including Alconbury Enterprise Campus - are just two of the locally-chosen programmes set to benefit over the next few years; alongside others that will improve skills attainment, create jobs, build homes and improve infrastructure.

This latest award of 'Local Growth Funding' is on top of £109 million of Growth Deal funding already awarded to the Greater Cambridge Greater Peterborough LEP. The total award could see 8,000 jobs created, 2,000 homes built and attract £29 million extra investment over the next five years.

Alongside historic devolution deals - one of which will mean Cambridgeshire and Peterborough benefits from an extra £800 million investment and a range of new powers – the Local Growth Fund equips local leaders with the cash they need to invest in and support locally determined projects.

In the Greater Cambridge Greater Peterborough area the Growth Fund is funding the construction of iMET, a new training facility that will deliver advanced technical skills in manufacturing, engineering and technology and located at Alconbury Enterprise Campus (see page 27 for more about iMET).

# **HCA grants £45million loan** for Alconbury Weald

Alconbury Weald was given a major boost in March when the Homes and Communities Agency (HCA) announced it had granted Urban&Civic a £45 million loan to help accelerate the delivery of the 1,400 acre former airfield site by funding the provision of vital infrastructure.

Speeding up house building is one of the key measures set out in the Government's Housing White Paper, so that the right homes come forward in the right places. The £3bn Home Building Fund has been developed to support large housing sites like Alconbury Weald to be delivered more quickly. The agreement follows a series of visits to the site, where the quality of landscape, infrastructure, housing and facilities coming forward has been held up as exemplar.

HCA Chief Executive Nick Walkley said: "This deal is exactly the sort of thing we are here to do – providing the means to realise the full potential of development sites and provide the impetus to enable a real transformation in local housing markets."

At Alconbury Weald, Urban&Civic has been able to phase major infrastructure to support the development of new

homes, community facilities and the Enterprise Zone. This funding will support an agreed phased investment plan in infrastructure over the next 10 years, including in roads, utilities and remediation works to unlock specific future parcels of housing. This funding will also enable Urban&Civic to bring forward its investment to put in place the Southern Gateway of the site onto the A141.

Tim Leathes, Development Director for Urban&Civic said: "This is great news for the development and a welcome endorsement that whilst Cambridgeshire needs housing, all partners are committed to ensuring that it is not at the expense of quality of life and setting, and comes alongside the infrastructure to support it. This funding does not change our plans, but enables us to get going quicker on preparing the next parcels of land for development."

Alconbury Weald is a major development of recognised quality and we will work closely with Urban&Civic to accelerate the new housing and community facilities that this site can delivery for a major growth region of the country.

# **Outline planning application** submitted for Waterbeach **Barracks and Airfield**

As part of the Company's commitment : The Waterbeach development will to regenerating brownfield sites to support local housing and economic need. Urban&Civic has been working with the Ministry of Defence to manage the development of the former barracks and airfield in Waterbeach, three miles north of Cambridge. The site was vacated in 2013, to enable development and remains in MOD ownership.

### Following over two years of

engagement, partnership working and forensic analysis of the site and local area, in February Urban&Civic and the Secretary of State for Defence submitted plans for the construction of up to 6,500 new homes, new schools and community facilities, and extensive investment in transport connections and green space. The development will support the acute need for housing North of the City, and develop strong public transport links to key employment centres such as the Science Park

The plans reflect an incredible military legacy of a 20 acre man-made lake and extensive woodland created by the Royal Engineers 40 years ago, as well as protecting the setting of the listed Denny Abbey, which sits north of the site. Much of the masterplanning centres around re-establishing an historic Causeway link between the Abbey and the village of Waterbeach, which was severed by the military use of the site.

This includes nearly £15m of investment to early cycle and bus connections and to support improvements to the local rail station, ahead of a significant contribution towards a strategic solution being developed for the Milton Interchange/ A14/A10 upgrade and improvements.

Nigel Hugill, Chief Executive of Urban&Civic, said: "Outside London, Waterbeach is the best brownfield site in the country. Three miles from the Cambridge Science Park with some of the most dynamic employment in the world, Waterbeach can help meet a demonstrable shortage of accessible accommodation in the north of the city, both from an expanding workforce and local residents who have lived here for generations.

"We have been working hard and listening hard to come up with the right plans to allow people to live near to where they work and ensure transport options to get people out of their cars and onto cycles and public transport."

# **Urban&Civic** invests in **St Neots**

Urban&Civic, as master developer, will be leading the future development of Wintringham Park in St Neots, following an agreement to acquire a one third partnership stake in the development alongside the Nuffield Trusts.

The 400 acre site (162.3 hectares) which lies by the railway station - is allocated under the Local Plan for development, with plans for up to 2,800 residential units, 63,500 sqm of employment space, a district centre and two primary schools. The move will see a new masterplan being developed with input from local partners and communities which is likely to be submitted later this year.

The land at St Neots has been in the ownership of the Nuffield Trusts since the 1940s and forms a major part of their bequest from the late Lord Nuffield. The Trusts are able to draw upon significant expertise in health and innovation and this will become a core part of the ambitious vision to design and deliver a well-planned development, supported by robust connections and infrastructure, high guality green space and improved well being.

This project represents Urban&Civic's third major holding with ready access to Cambridge. It is situated in a priority growth corridor for the area, with the development looking to unlock further investment in transport connections.
